St Brigid's Day Cross



The St. Brigid's Cross, traditional made with rushes is kept above doors in homes to watch over and keep families safe. Brigid is said to have sat by the bed of an ill Chieftain, consoling and calming him and it is here that she picked up the rushes from the floor and began weaving them into the distinctive cross pattern. Whilst she weaved, she explained the meaning of the cross to the sick Chieftain and her calming words helped the man. Since that day, it has been an Irish tradition, on the eve of her Feast Day (1st February) for the Irish people to make a St. Brigid's Cross of straw or rushes and place it inside the house over the door.


